3.0 PRESENTATIONS

3.1 Canadian Federation for the Humanities and Social Sciences (J.-C. Guédon) The CFHSS encourages collaboration between the CFHSS and its member societies. Ongoing issues include: open access; the choosing of the new president of SSHRC; funding for publications. Next year's Congress will be at the University of Saskatchewan, May 26 to June 2 2007. The 2008 Congress will be at UBC, 2009 at Carleton and 2010 at the Université de Montréal.

5.0 PRESIDENT'S REMARKS (Y. Roberge)

Thanks also to Ileana Paul (Acting Secretary); Rose-Marie Déchaine and Mireille Tremblay (invited speakers organizers); Peter Avery, Gabriela Alboiu and Milica Radisic (local organizers); Gabriela Alboiu (Student Paper Contest), Elaine Gold (Advisor on the Status of Women); Yvan Rose (CLA e-mail list); Daniel Currie Hall (website); and Éliane Lebel (translations). The 2006 proceedings will be co-edited by the past and current student representatives. More information will be posted on the website.

Comment: There will be an upcoming email vote on changes to the constitution.

6.0 New Business

6.1 CJL Editorship: Proposals for changes in governance (R.-M. Déchaine) Déchaine explained that although the journal is behind in its publication schedule, it will be caught up at the end of the summer. Some structural changes are necessary, changes that require changes in the constitution. The goals behind these changes are: continuity of production, inclusiveness, and a smooth transition for editorship. The proposed changes include moving to 3 issues a year (rather than 4) and modifying how the editor is appointed. Much like the presidency, there will be an associate editor, an editor and a consulting (outgoing) editor.

Roberge discussed the creation of a new ad-hoc outreach committee in order to improve external relations and the promotion of linguistics in the greater society. The general mandate is attached. Susanne Carroll has accepted to chair this committee.

In order to encourage presentations in French, Tremblay announced that from next year, the language of the title of the abstract will be the language of the talk. It was also suggested to offer the possibility of poster sessions next year. Tremblay encouraged members to propose joint sessions with other associations and to suggest thematic sessions.

Proposal for the creation of an Outreach Committee

1. Terms of reference

The Outreach Committee identifies and coordinates programs and activities having an external focus with an objective of influencing non-members and increasing their awareness of the CLA and linguistics in Canada.

2. The CLA Outreach Award

OBJECTIVES

To recognize the contributions of an individual whose scientific outreach has had an impact on the understanding of linguistics among the general public, or of an individual who has played a considerable role in raising public awareness of the importance of linguistics research in Canada.

DEADLINE FOR NOMINATIONS

December 1 of the year before the award is made. The Award will be given every other year if a candidate is considered suitable; next award in June 2008.

NOMINATION DOSSIER

A nomination must be supported by three (3) people, and must be sponsored by a member of the CLA. No nomination form is necessary. Supporting documents submitted by the sponsor must provide the following information:

the candidate's name, affiliation, postal address, email, etc.; an academic statement, at most 250 words, which concisely specifies the reasons why the candidate should receive the proposed distinction; a detailed appraisal of the work of the proposed candidate, at most 1000 words;

the candidate's curriculum vitae, maximum 20 pages. The list of publications pertinent to the award should be included.

the application dossier may include letters of support.

The completed application must include five (5) copies of the nomination dossier and should be submitted to:

2006 Report of the Program Committee

1. Abstract Acceptance Rate

Of the 116 abstracts received by the Committee, 14 were rejected, and 3 were withdrawn, leaving 99 talks on the final programme. In previous years, the figures were:

The overall acceptance rate was 87.9%, similar to the rate for previous years :

Of the 99 talks on the final program, 13 (13%) are in French, and 54 talks (52.9%) have student authors. Last year, 21.1% of the talks were in French, and 44.4% had student authors.

At the beginning of March, two members and the chair of the committee met in Kingston.

4 Electronic Submission of abstracts

111 of the 116 abstracts were submitted by e-mail, with no serious technical problems. The former chair of the Committee had created a permanent Gmail address for CLA submissions and consequently occasional quota overloads were avoided. I propose to increase the automation of the submission process to allow for a more efficient management of the files.

5 CJL Invited Speakers

On the occasion of the 50th anniversary of the *Canadian Journal of Linguistics*, the Program Committee (in collaboration with the Journal) invited the 10 contributors to the *50th anniversary* special issue of the Journal to participate in this year's CLA conference. Seven contributors accepted the invitation. The Programme Committee wishes to thank the editor of the Journal, Rose-Marie Déchaine, for her help in the planning of this series of invited talks.

The Programme Committee wishes to thank Daniel Currie Hall, who posted the Call for Papers, the Conference Program, and the many updates on the CLA website, as well as Yvan Rose, who sent announcements to the CLA list.
